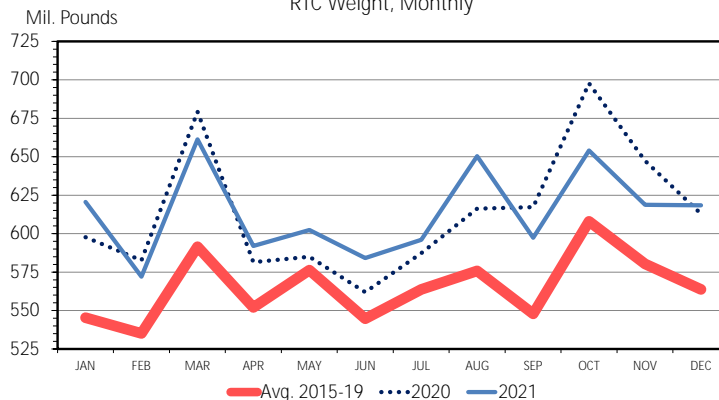


The [February 11, 2022](#), DLR discussed the recent finding of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in an Indiana turkey farm on February 8, 2022. Since that DLR [USDA APHIS](#) also confirmed that on February 12, 2022 HPAI was found in a commercial broiler chicken flock in Fulton County, Kentucky and also a backyard mixed species flock in Fauquier County, Virginia on a February 12, 2022. As noted in the February 11, 2022, DLR both cases are significant as they have occurred in two different flyways. Fulton County, Kentucky is in the Mississippi Flyway and Fauquier County, Virginia is in the Atlantic Flyway. The [Indiana State Board of Animal Health](#) reported another depopulated turkey flock in Dubois County, Indiana and one pending in Greene county. USDA APHIS has yet to confirm this recent HPAI case. The current number of commercial poultry flocks affected has been small but the potential market impacts, especially due to trade restrictions, could be large and thus bears monitoring.

With cases occurring in commercial broiler flocks, this further amplifies the potential impacts to broiler exports. In 2021, broiler exports totaled nearly 7.4 billion pounds, up less than one percent or 307,000 pounds from 2020. Mexico was the top destination with almost 1.6 billion pounds shipped which accounted for nearly a quarter (22%) of total exports last year. Exports to the Caribbean (Cuba, Haiti, Bahamas, St. Lucia, Aruba, Antigua & Barbuda) were 925.2 million pounds which accounted for 13% of total exports. Shipments to China were 382.4 million pounds or 5% of the total. Canada and Angola both accounted for 4.3% of total broiler exports at 316.1 and 317.8 million pounds shipped, respectively. The countries listed above collectively accounted for nearly half (48%) of total broiler exports in 2021.

According to the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) [Import and Export Library](#) website, as of this DLR writing, five of the countries listed above (Haiti, Bahamas, Aruba, Antigua & Barbuda, and Angola) have not placed any restrictions on broiler exports from the HPAI infected states of Indiana, Kentucky, or Virginia. The remaining states have placed varying degrees of restrictions. Cuba, St. Lucia, and China, have restricted poultry exports on or after February 8, 2022, from Indiana and from Kentucky on or after February 12, 2022. Poultry products are ineligible to be shipped to Mexico from Indiana on or after January 11, 2022, while product is ineligible from Kentucky and Virginia on or after January 17, 2022. Canada has stated poultry exports are ineligible from the 10km radius zone surrounding the positive counties in Indiana and Kentucky as of February 8 and 12,

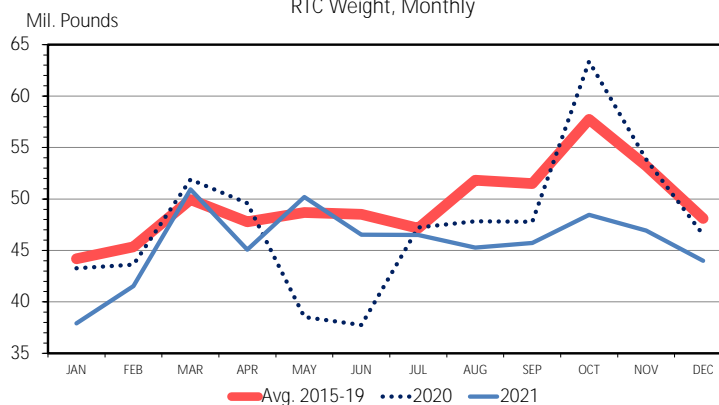
US BROILER EXPORTS RTC Weight, Monthly

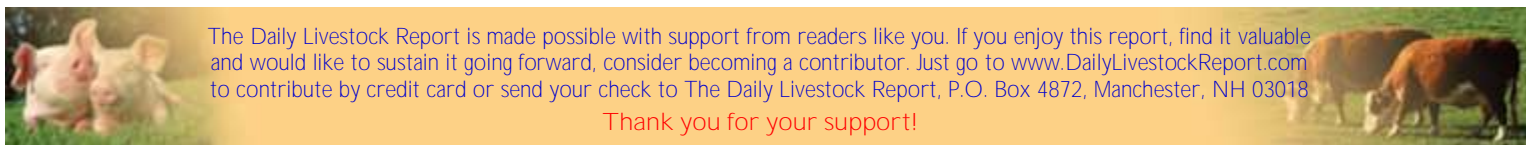
US TURKEY EXPORTS RTC Weight, Monthly
